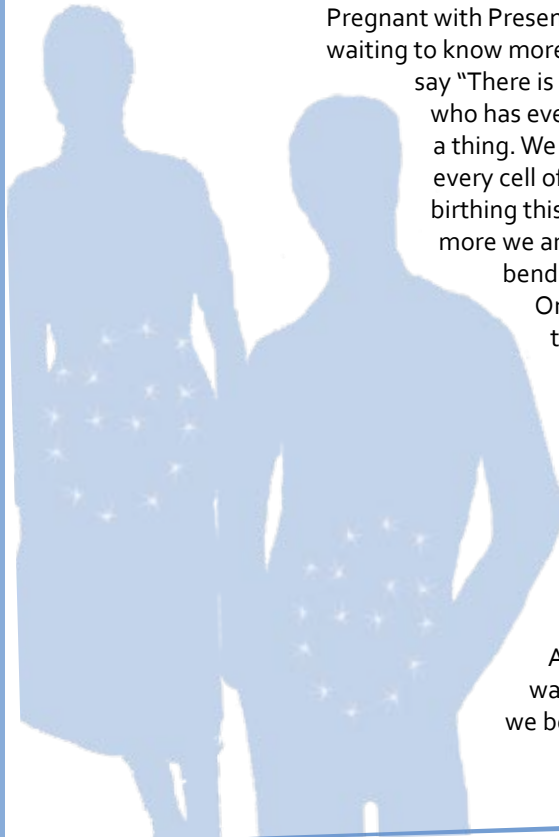
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PRESENCE

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REFLECTIONS FROM THE CHAIR

REFLECTIONS

At the end of my e-mails, you'll find six words:

- Love mercy
- Do justice
- Walk humbly

These have been a personal mission statement for several years. You may recognize that it's loosely based on Micah 6:8. "He has shown all you people what is good. And what does the Lord require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God." (*Today's New International Version*)

If you'll indulge me, I'd like to briefly share what this means to me. Keep in mind, I'm not a Bible scholar. My intent is not to change your mind if it means something else to you. But it might give insights into what I hope to bring to the Spirituality Network during my tenure.

Love Mercy reminds me to consider how I interact with my neighbor ... and I define my neighbor as everyone with whom I share my life, be it my wife, my children, my friends, or the stranger I encounter on the street. Every one of us needs forgiveness at some time or another. Our God is a God of second chances ... and third chances ... and seventy times seven chances. I've been the recipient of this grace. I can offer no less.

Do Justice reminds me to consider how I show up for my community. Again, I see my community pretty broadly. I suppose some see this phrase from the perspective of meting out justice for wrongdoing. Instead, I see it as need to ensure that all have fair opportunities. Contrary to what our founding fathers described, I don't think all people are created equal. From the moment of conception, some of us have advantages that others do not. That doesn't mean we shouldn't work toward creating a place where those who have been marginalized have those opportunities.

Walk Humbly reminds me to consider how I view myself. I have to see myself as God sees me. I don't think God wants me to think more of myself than I deserve. Nor do I think He wants me to think of myself as less than I am. The second half is often the most challenging for me, so I have to remind myself that God created me in His image.

I wish I could say I achieve all of these principles consistently. Sometimes the best I can hope for is that I recognize when I do not ... and adjust my heart, mind, and actions more quickly than I did when I was younger. John Wesley asked his followers, "Are you moving on toward perfection?" I'm trying to let go of perfection ... and just try to do a little better. I hope you'll join me on my journey.

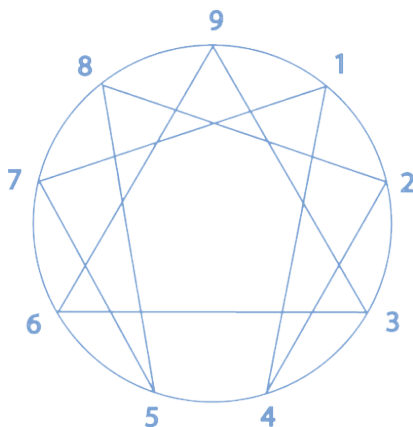

BOOKS

AND MORE

Discerning Life Transitions: Listening Together in Spiritual Direction, by Dwight H. Judy (Morehouse Publishing, 2010).

Judy has written *Discerning Life Transitions* not only for people in discernment, but equally for spiritual directors accompanying individuals in discernment. He notes that his own life has been marked by major transitions every 10 to 15 years, and often these included changes in location too. Drawing on examples from his life and the lives of women and men he has accompanied in discernment, Judy explores a wide range of transitions arising from longings and life structures. These include shifts from lives full of accomplishment to new awareness, surprise, and a sense of being, as well as the opposite shift from being to doing.

The author adapts Daniel Levinson's *The Seasons of a Man's Life* to the arena of faith. The five outcomes of life structure for Levinson are Advancement within a stable structure; Advancement that produces a change in life structure; Failure within life structure; Breaking out—seeking a new life structure; and, Unstable life structure. Judy challenges believers to examine their faith and their practice of faith. Judy suggests a creative change process of “being born over again ... and again ... and again ... and again.”

Judy provides exercises a reader can use to work through the discernment themes. The exercises can be done individually, but there is a suggestion to work with a group, a small community, as a good way to proceed. Judy has spiritual disciplines for discernment and he asks, “What is one thing you will do each week just for fun?” He gives examples such as lunch with a friend, taking a walk or going to a movie, but encourages readers to name an activity and to schedule it so it happens.

The reader is invited to explore a passionate commitment and creative relinquishment, asking oneself, “What must I release in order to make way for that which is calling me now?” This exploration is deepened through reflection on scripture passages such as John 15: 1-11, a scene in which Jesus is the vine and his Father is the gardener, and one must be united with Jesus to bear fruit. The vine is pruned to be more fruitful. How does one face the hard question of what is “dead wood” in your life and notice what is ready to sprout?

Behold! (CD) by The River's Voice, Trish and Richard Bruxvoort-Colligan (River's Voice Music, 2002). A collection of traditional and original music for the Christmas season. Singer-songwriters and husband/wife team of Trish and Richard invite us to slow down and listen to the wisdom of the season.

Splash! Bathtime and Bedtime Music for Grown-Up Girls (CD) by Trish Bruxvoort-Colligan (River's Voice Music, rereleased 2010). A soulful combination of humor and inspiration in music that reflects a woman's experience and inspires empowerment.

The Artist's Rule: Nurturing Your Creative Soul with Monastic Wisdom by Christine Valters Paintner (Sorin Books, 2011). A 12-week course that immerses the reader in a creative process of discovery through prayer and reflection. Each week offers suggestions for grounding both the creative and the spiritual life through three practices: walking, lectio divina, and journaling, supplemented by online resources.

He explores the ways that the natural world offers important lessons for humanity.

In many ways Judy's book is about growing in wholeness and he leads discerners through a time of prayer, listening to one's longings, aspirations, hopes, and realities. He concludes by encouraging discerners to review the work they have done, and, if there is not one clear outcome, to “live” the different outcomes for a period of time to see if one or the other “settle(s) in your heart.” In the end one can make an action plan, check with others, and check with Christ in order to go forward with confidence.

ONLY CONNECT:

SISTER NOREEN MALONE ON THE NETWORK'S ANNIVERSARY

Two words shimmer again and again in a conversation with Sister Noreen Malone: *connected* and *process*. As the organization she founded crosses the quarter century mark, a conversation about her perspective on the Network's past, present, and future shows how those qualities are interwoven in the lives of Sr Noreen and the Spirituality Network.

Has the Network become what you dreamed it would be?

"I am filled with awe that the Network is in its 25th year. My life, I can honestly say, is filled with gratitude for the dream of the Network. It wasn't that I had a dream for the network. It's the people's dream, here in central Ohio—God's people, all people." Early ministry experiences as a teacher, principal, and then vicar for religious and for vocations for the Diocese of Columbus taught her what people were looking for. "What they wanted and sometimes did find in their churches was connectedness, a sense of the holy in their lives, something that would help them remain hopeful. They just wanted more"

"How does a single mother with children at the family shelter stay connected and grounded? A man out of work for 2½ years—how does he stay hopeful? That for me is spirituality. However God presents God's self to us that helps us know we are not alone, that we are in relationship with God, others, and ourselves. I realized that is what everybody was looking for." When her attempts to fulfill this ministry in mainstream organizations were challenged, "I had to trust that God could use someone like me in ways new to me and others, and if we were going to reach people we had to find a way." And so the Network came to be based on principles that were very much Dominican principles—community, ministry, a contemplative way of living. "One of the greatest gifts God gives me is connecting with people. They're always teaching me—when we can be authentic, the energy between us comes to life. Today we're all connected with technology, but are our hearts and spirits connected? The Network helps people to be connected." She is grateful for Sr Carol Ann Spencer and Wellstreams leaders for building a reservoir of Wellstreams graduates who can help people practice connecting with their inner journey.

Also dear to her heart is the Women to Women Listening Ministry. "Meeting with women suffering from addiction, domestic violence, homelessness, poverty ... how do they do it day after day? They must be connected to something that gives them hope. In Women to Women we are present to and learning from those considered to be on the margins. That's the good news of the Gospel. If we're not about those on the margins, we've lost sight of the core of the Gospel mission.

There is a need to bring equality at every level or the next generation will suffer. I see reenergizing awareness of the importance of Women to Women." Women to Women now has 40 people serving as companions and a fifth site is opening at Shepard Library (see p. 11).



Has anything surprised you about how the Network has developed?

"The theme of the early days was 'If this is of God, it will continue.' Although there were difficult financial struggles, I am grateful to acknowledge 12 years of total support from the Dominican Sisters who housed us and sponsored my presence at the Network. The surprise is that while we moved toward greater ecumenism and through the financial difficulties, others learned to walk the journey. Now people who don't know who I am are very involved because they recognize the message as their own. I look at the new quilt ministry, at Always We Begin Again, that's the fire of new life—a constant stoking of the fire in our spiritual journey."

"I am also pleased by the growing number of men, though we still need more equality of participation. We're in this together. That connectedness again. We need ALL people on the spectrum. We need people on the margins to be invited to sit with us in developing the future and offer their perceptions and insights. To experience community, to know that we're more alike than different. We have the same dreams, desires, worries."

"Over these 25 years I've been in awe to observe how staff, board, and committee members adopted the practice of discernment. Every meeting begins with centering on God's presence within us and among us, guiding and directing our work together. That's Dominican."

Has anything disappointed you?

"Not disappointment perhaps, but fear that we will lose sight of the fact that it is the Spirit that runs the Network. Sometimes we get caught up in thinking it is our work, our doing. That's the closest to disappointment I've been. I want us never to lose sight that the one who calls us is God and we respond. All of us can get caught up in responsibility. We think we're in charge. But who is the creator?"

She also speaks of a missing piece, when an early ecological focus shifted away from the Network to Shepherd's Corner. The Network's involvement in *Awakening the Dreamer—Changing the Dream* (see p. 5) is now helping reinforce the commitment to the earth.

What are your hopes for the Network's next 25 years?

"I recognize that the paschal mystery—transformation—is always part of the process: dying to self, giving way to new life. We have to realize if we try to do it alone we won't be able to. One of my dreams: I am working with Pat Gibboney and Rebecca Bass on a solidarity scholarship that would assure us that reaching out to the margins will always be a primary role. Solidarity is a key word. Not helping another but standing with another and being strengthened by each other."

"The spiritual journey is always pushing us to a deeper place. When we face difficult things the mystery of the Spirit is there just as much. We must be willing to look at the shadow, to go deeper. The Spirituality Network has never been needed more, perhaps in ways we are not aware of yet."

While studying with people of other faith traditions at Shalem, "God became bigger, came out of the box for me there. Although I am committed to my Catholic faith, I am aware that others have different ways of worship. Another hope I have is that the Network can expand the ripples with other traditions. It is enlivening to pray with others in a wider context. We need that connectedness."

How has your spiritual journey evolved in the second half of life?

"My way of praying as an adult: God is faithful and I am the "imago Dei" who keeps trying to imitate that faithfulness and falling short over and over. It's not about perfection, not how we do it, but that we keep trying. Often in spiritual direction I use this gesture" [she intersects the fingers of both hands]. "A directee said, 'I get that—it means staying in the process.' I told her when I'm in my casket, arrange my fingers that way and everyone will see it and know what it means, I've said it so often! Staying on the journey, in the process. Growing up a good little Catholic girl, I always tried to do things perfectly. Now I trust that God is in the imperfections. My call for each of us is to stay in the process no matter what."

"I can get so caught up in the moment and I'm learning that's okay if I can stay connected, if the 'Martha' actions come from a contemplative 'Mary' place. The Mary stance can happen when I least expect it. For example, when asked to preach or write, I think I should be sitting down and doing the work, but instead everything I read or person I meet is the textbook, the Jerome bible commentary I needed to hear. Every single person can be a connecting link for me." With the world as her text, Sr Noreen is a prophet as defined by Brazilian educator Paulo Freire, who wrote: "Prophets are those who are willing to be a 'presence' in the world and are prepared to engage critically in reading the word and the world."

What is the next step on your spiritual journey?

"Now as a Dominican Sister of Peace I have a new awareness of the importance of peace; When we experience deep-seated, genuine authentic peace, then we will know the next step has taken place."

"I am aware that my health and my age mean that it is time to move out of leadership of Women to Women. A collaborative circle of leaders is in development. At a recent retreat led by Sr. Maxine Shonk, I was working with clay and formed a chrysalis. The next day we were asked what do we have to let go of. The woman next to me smashed her piece and started again. But I wanted the butterfly to emerge. I was tired of waiting, yet knowing it can't be forced!"

"As I sat with my clay chrysalis, I had the ever-new awareness that the next step is—waiting. Letting the Spirit that started this continue. I will know when it's time to move on. The spirit is always doing something new. Waiting for the next step to unfold and whatever shape and color that butterfly will have will come through. In the early years of major struggle, I had the image of a very tall board fence that had no niches or handholds. I was constantly scrambling to try to climb the fence to see what the next step was, getting splinters in my hands, falling backwards. When I would finally get to the top, the next step had already been taken and I had had nothing to do with it."

With the wisdom of her soon-to-be-80 years she said, "I'm not scrambling as hard as I used to."
